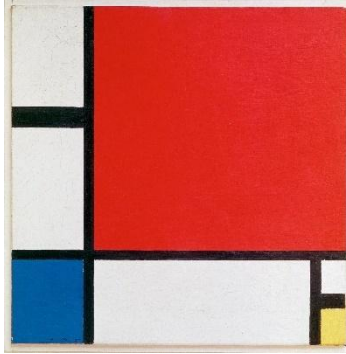


KS1.CB.T1	Area of study: Line and Colour  Unit aims / outcome: To use horizontal and vertical lines to create a grid for their own composition in the style of Piet Mondrian.	
Art and Design concepts to organise knowledge: <b>Drawing:</b> To learn how to use a ruler to draw horizontal and vertical lines.  <b>Painting:</b> To know how to use the primary colours in the style of Piet Mondrian.		
Key strands of learning:		
<b>Disciplinary knowledge:</b> (line, tone, shape, space etc...)		
To use horizontal and vertical lines to enclose space and create squares and rectangles.		
Learning in Reception: Children will have had lots of mark-making experiences with various media (pencils, crayons, pens, chalk, paint), which will have enabled them to work on their gross and fine motor skills to make a range of marks and visual images. Children will know that the primary colours are red, blue and yellow and have used them in their own work. NC objective:	Vocabulary and crucial knowledge:	
To use a range of materials creatively to design and make products.  To use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination.  To develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space.	<u>Context of study:</u> Children will learn that an <b>artist</b> is someone who <b>draws or paints pictures</b> or creates <b>sculptures</b> as a job or a hobby. Children will be inspired by <b>Piet Mondrian</b> , who was best known for his <b>abstract paintings</b> . Children will learn that abstract art does not show things that are recognisable such as people, objects or landscapes. Instead artists like Mondrian used <b>horizontal</b> and <b>vertical</b> lines to achieve effect. Children will learn how to use a ruler to draw <b>horizontal</b> and <b>vertical</b> lines. Children will recap the <b>primary colours</b> and know that <b>Mondrian</b> used red, blue and yellow for most of his artwork. Children will apply their knowledge of <b>horizontal</b> and <b>vertical</b> lines to create their own artwork based on Piet Mondrian Compositions.	

To learn about the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work.



Crucial Knowledge:

To know that **Piet Mondrian** was an **artist** who was best known for his **abstract paintings**.

To know that **abstract** art does not show things that are recognisable such as people, objects or landscapes. Instead Mondrian used lines to create effect.

To learn how to **hold** a ruler in one hand and draw with the other.

To learn how to gently push your pencil against the ruler to draw lines.

To know how to use a ruler to draw **horizontal** and **vertical** lines.

To enclose space using **horizontal** and **vertical** lines to create squares and rectangles.

To draw **horizontal** and **vertical** lines to create an asymmetric grid in the style of Mondrian.

To know that the **primary colours** are red, blue and yellow.

To know that the word **composition** describes the way that different elements are put together in a work of art.
